

Aston Rowant Walk

Walks likely to be suitable for people with impaired mobility and users of wheelchairs, mobility scooters and pushchairs



Aston Rowant National Nature Reserve is an area of woodland and downland on top of the Chilterns escarpment. There are fantastic views and a good chance to see Red Kites. There is car parking.

Path Information

Most of the nature reserve is very hilly with narrow grass paths. There are two routes with a wide firm surface: ● There is a 150m path from the main car park to a viewpoint. ● The longer, flatter, 750m path through beech woods finishes at the gate (one way opening) where it enters the downland, in order to protect rare plants. To progress to the viewpoint involves a grassy and uneven path, which is likely to prove difficult for users of wheelchairs and mobility vehicles. The main car park has large loose stone surfacing. The map shows the two routes with information about surfacing and slopes to help you to decide if they are suitable for you.

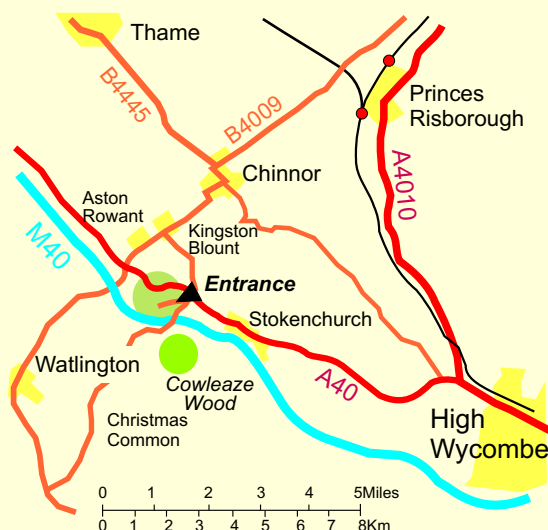
Visitor Information

- Open at all times.
- Nearest public/disabled toilets in Chinnor (3 miles away) at the Chinnor Village Centre 01844 353733.
- Nearest refreshments in Chinnor, Stokenchurch or Christmas Common.
- Dogs are welcome but must be kept under control.
- The Reserve is managed by Natural England. Call 01844 351833 for more information about the Reserve or to report any problems. www.naturalengland.org.uk

How to get there






The car park is at the end of the minor road, which leads off the road between the A40 and Christmas Common. The reserve is signposted from the A40 and Christmas Common Road.










Path surfaces




-  Tarmac road, can be used but beware of vehicles
-  Hard path bumpy in places with some loose stones up to 30 mm

-  Challenging. Natural grass path. Not firm and very uneven
